

California Regulations Small Containers of Refrigerant R-134a Refrigerant Cans

Environmental Hazards Associated with Refrigerant

The State of California has determined that the release of HFC refrigerant 134a, a greenhouse gas, contributes to global warming.

R-134a is a HFC (hydrofluorocarbon) refrigerant and therefore, doesn't deplete the ozone layer like chlorofluorocarbon (CFC), halons, and hydrochlorofluorocarbon (HCFC) refrigerants.

R-134a, however, is considered a high global warming potential gas (GWP) with a GWP rating of 1,430.

Compared to Carbon Dioxide (CO2) which has a GWP rating of 1. A high GWP rating indicates an increased potential to warm the earth's atmosphere thereby having a greater environmental impact.

California Air Resource Board (CARB) law requires that all small containers must have self-sealing valves, improved labeling of the deposit/return program & how-to instructions, as well as an educational

Venting Prohibition

program for do-it-yourselfers.

Section 608 of the Clean Air Act prohibits the intentional release (venting) of any refrigerant when maintaining, servicing, repairing, or disposing of air conditioning or refrigeration equipment, including MVAC systems.
